The court appointed the 26th day of May 1874 for the hearing of the boundary of Kamamalo at Anahola on the day above named, Mr H. Johnson appearing for the general and Mr Sheriff Wilson Nelson for the crown.

Kaunakahi Sworn

I was born at Anahola always lived there I know the boundary of Kamamalo. My father describes it to me. His name was Kawasai, the boundary commences at the beach at a large pond or opening of salt water a point of land runs into the opening and this point is the boundary. The place is called Pappalooa thence up and over plain to a town called Hanihua thence to where road crosses a hollow Pihopohuiki thence to a large pond in stream one half of which belongs to Anahola and one

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half to this land and called Mamakale, thence to a small ridge and round said ridge to top of small hill called Keakini thence to Kailanahauana in Ollilila where this land joins with Kailanahauana and Keala, thence down the Keala boundary to the sea Pekeuki Suva

Was born at Anahala lived there all my life I know the boundary of this land was told it by parties who knew it also by my father whose name was Leleua, the western boundary of Kamalamalo commences at a point of rocks on one side of an opening in the reef the opening belongs to Kamalamalo, the place is called Pappaloo thence to a clump of stones or rocks Kalepoo thence to a lot of stones near Kamihoo which latter place belongs to Kamalamalo and called Apulee, thence to a small hollow where roads cross Papposhooka, thence to an old settlement of houses called Kaleakawale, thence to a large basin or pond one half belongs to Anahala one half to this land called Kamakale, thence up ridge to plain Kamakawa continuing up plain to Pekeawapoo and thence to junction with road at a place called Kelehuakamalii thence through wood following old road to the point of a small ridge Puawa and following round ridge to Keakini and thence to a large gorge or basin dug out by Kelesmahauana here the western boundary of Kamalamalo terminates by its junction with Kalehuai and Keala; The Eastern boundary then follows the head of Keala to the sea

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Decision

Commencing at the west side of an opening in the reef adjoining Anahala and called Pappaloo where there is a large cross made on side of bank, immediately above the sand beach and from thence running westerly to a clump of stones or rocks called Kalepoo and thence continuing through fern plain to Apulee a lot of stones near Kamihoo, which latter place is in Kamalamalo, thence to where the road crosses

a small hollow Pohopohoiki, thence to where there used to be a settlement of houses in olden times called Kalaakawale, thence through a large basin or pond in small stream one half of which belongs to Kamāhāmalo and the other half to Anahulu, said basin or pond is called Mamakāhāmalo from thence up small ridge and on to plain to a place called Kāhāmalo-kāhāmalo and thence through open space to Peckawāwāwā thence continuing through open plain or flat to its junction with the road at a place called Kāhāmalokāhāmalo, thence along the road through wood to the west corner of a small ridge immediately above the Anahulu river and called Pūwāwā thence following round said small ridge to Keakāhāmalo and thence up through forest to a large gulch or gorge represented to be in Ohihāhā and dug out by Kāhāmalokāhāmalo at this gorge the western boundary of Kamāhāmalo terminates by junction with the boundaries of Kāhāmalo, Anahulu and Keakāhāmalo, and from thence it runs down the western boundary of Kāhāmalo to the sea

Thence the boundary crosses the Auewai and stream just above the Pahala Waterfall and continues along foot-hill bushes to the edge of the woods at entrance of old road way & and up said road way to Pihakuhapai on the following rates
S 85° W 925 lks crossing auewai and stream to a haw bush planted
Thence N 84° 59' W 260 lks to haw bush planted and bolt to broken at its root Thence N 89° 35' W 1307 lks to edge of woods.

S 88° 15' W 1650 up general run of old road through woods
N 78° 45' W 1800 to top of Pihakuhapai a grass hill surrounded by the bush and from whence the following flow
